Scholarship

The Briscoe Cemetery Restoration

As you know, the Cole Association has been raising funds to cover the cost of the ground-penetrating radar at the Briscoe cemetery. During the reunion, we had several incentives toward this goal. We sold hats and T-shirts, netting \$823, held a silent auction and raffle, netting \$869, and passed the hat, collecting \$349 for the general fund, \$432 for the cemetery fund, and \$235 for the scholarship fund. The walk brought in \$349. The ground penetrating radar cost \$4,000. Radar aims to locate bodies and artifacts (stones that have fallen or broken) buried at Briscoe Cemetery.

Brick Campaign- Another incentive was started in 2023 to sell bricks and use those funds toward the Briscoe Cemetery Restoration Project. The previously ordered bricks have arrived and will be placed at the Briscoe Cemetery, providing a walkway and making it available for people to go and view their brick(s). Cole Family Goes to California

My grandmother, Georgia Emma Bell (front, second from right—I have no confirmation, but I feel certain this is her); her father, John Richard Bell (seated right); her mother, Ida Louella Cole is almost certainly standing behind him (but the 10 Cole sisters are hard to distinguish one from another); and her grandparents, Jane Mary Sweany and William Temple Cole—"Uncle Billy"—(seated left); and Tyree Harris Bell.

Both of my paternal grandmother's grandfathers were well known in their time, especially her paternal grandfather, General Tyree H. Bell, CSA, commanding Bell's Brigade of Nathan Bedford Forrest's cavalry, about whom there has even been a military biography published, as well as a printed family monograph. We know exactly when, why, and how he brought his family to California. How W.T. Cole came to California, though, is harder to pin down—there is no published biography, no Wikipedia page. But some of his legends seem to me to have elements of factual history that might be traceable, and earlier this year I set out to see if I could distinguish fact from fantasy, especially in trying to discover how W.T. came to California, establishing a branch of the Cole family here.

A story that has come down through the years is that W.T. first came to California as a soldier on one of John C. Frémont's exploring expeditions. W.T. would have been 19 to 20 years old during Frémont's early expeditions, so it's not impossible, but I can find no trace of him in Frémont's highly detailed personnel records. One hand-written, undated, and unsigned document in my files states that W.T. came to California by ship, but I can find no corroboration of this assertion anywhere. The most frequent story in my family is that W.T. led a wagon train to California, meeting his future wife, Jane Mary Sweany, on that train, but again, this has been hard to pin down—but maybe not impossible.

Sweany family records show that the family arrived near Dixon, California in September of 1850, appropriate timing for an 1850 wagon train trip from Missouri. While none of the family names are found in books like Rasmussen's California Wagon Train Lists, family mythology relates that a startling incident occurred early in the journey, and maybe if I could pin down the curious incident, I could identify the wagon train more precisely. (More on this incident at a future time.) My exploring the internet for information on wagon trains then led me to that magnificent resource, the Oregon-California Trails Association, octa-trails.org. Among its many virtues, O-CTA has compiled detailed lists of all persons known to have traveled on those western trails from the earliest days, lists easily available to the public. And there I found W.T. Cole!

Joining octa-trails.org allowed me to determine exactly the source for the O-CTA information about Uncle Billy and also led me to yet another fabulous resource, the Missouri Historical Review, which in 1928 printed the never-before-published diary of Bennett C. Clark of Boonville under the title "Diary of a Journey from Missouri to California in 1849." W.T. was a genuine 49er, as were the rest of these adventurers from Boonville: "Beverly Lampton, John Tucker, William T. Cole, Samuel Peters, Bennett C. Clark, John Corum, Newton C. Peters, Jesse Newman, William Norman [sic.], Mark Cole, John N. Gibson, Alfred Corum, Andrew B. Cole, John Brown, John Hill, Thomas Craig, Lewis Hutchinson, James M. Hill, Herod Corum, Simon Corum, James Campbell, James W. Newby, Hardise Reddick, and Dr. Saml. J. Tutt." I now have excellent documentation of how W.T. came to California, in 1849 at least (To be continued.)

William Kastner and his family live in California, where there is a large Cole contingent. In our conversations, Will has offered to write stories about the family.
